from our LEADERSHIP TEAM:








*According to the most recent Family Supports Needs Assessment (FSNA) put together by the Pennsylvania Department of Human Services, approximately 38% of eligible 3 & 4-year-old children in Luzerne County and 41% of eligible 3 & 4-year-old children in Wyoming County have access to a publicly funded, high-quality pre-k program. The FSNA shows approximately 31% of children in Luzerne County and 17% of children in Wyoming County under the age of 5-years-old are living in economically high-risk families with incomes at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). This report shows Luzerne County ranks as the 5th highest county in the state of PA in terms of percent of children who are under 5-years-old and living in households at or below 100% of the FPL.

health & dental OUTCOMES:



BRUSHING UP ON ORAL HEALTH AT HEAD START

Good oral health habits are crucial to a young child's overall health and well-being and are an important part of the Head Start program. In the spring of 2022, LCHS partnered with The Wright Center for Community Health, Geisinger and St. Luke's to provide dental services to Head Start children and staff who did not have a dental home or insurance. The Wright Center brought its "Driving Better Health" mobile van to LCHS's Beekman Street center in Wilkes-Barre. Staff from St. Luke's visited children at LCHS's Carson Street and HIP centers in Hazleton. Geisinger visited all other Head Start locations. This project helped to advance our mission by improving the oral health and wellness of children/staff who live in poverty and/or are uninsured.

SNAP PARTICIPANTS NOW ELIGIBLE FOR HEAD START SERVICES

The Office of Head Start announced in the spring of 2022 that families who receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits are eligible to apply for Head Start/Early Head Start services. This policy change allows Luzerne County Head Start to reach more families, minimizes the burden on families seeking public assistance, and coordinates benefit programs so that families eligible for one program can more easily participate in other services for which they qualify. The inclusion of SNAP benefits as public assistance expands the pool of eligible participants in Head Start programs nationwide.



screening, assessment & child **OUTCOMES:**


LCHS is committed to supporting children and families with school readiness, self-sufficiency and success in life. Our program provides children with comprehensive health, nutrition, and other family support services, as well as a developmentally appropriate early childhood education.

LCHS uses Teaching Strategies Gold (TSG) as the assessment tool for our Head Start program and Hawaii Early Learning Profile (HELP) as the assessment tool for our Early Head Start program. Both tools support the goals and objectives of the curriculums we use in our early learning programs.

EARLY HEAD START CHILDREN 0 TO 3-YEARS-OLD



These graphs represent the gains demonstrated by Early Head Start children who were assessed for at least two terms (six months) during the 2021-2022 program year.

- Social and Emotional Development – 96%




HEAD START/HSSAP CHILDREN 3-YEARS-OLD

VOLUNTEERS SPRUCE UP HEAD START AS PART OF 'DAY OF CARING'

Employees from the Greater Wyoming Valley Chamber of Commerce volunteered at LCHS as part of the United Way of Wyoming Valley's 29th annual "Day of Caring." The "Day of Caring" is when representatives from several businesses and organizations across the community join other private citizens to come together as volunteers, roll up their sleeves, and set to work helping nonprofit and charitable organizations throughout the Wyoming Valley. This past year, nine volunteers from The Chamber of Commerce, including LCHS's Board of Directors member, Ahmad Ali, completed outdoor projects including washing windows, raking leaves and planting flowers at LCHS's central office building in Wilkes-Barre.

CRAFTING NATURAL PLAY SPACES FOR CHILDREN

LCHS is incorporating natural play spaces into existing playground areas at our Wilkes-Barre, Beekman Street and LCCC, Nanticoke Head Start centers. A natural play space is an intentionally designed

outdoor classroom that helps to enhance child development. The idea for the project came together following a lecture at Wilkes University that discussed how children are experiencing a

nature deficit disorder. Natural play areas help children reconnect with the environment. These areas allow for more physical movement, and present opportunities for children to enhance their problem solving, critical thinking, language and literacy, math, construction and engineering, and visual-spatial thinking skills. In the fall of 2021, LCHS worked with 'Nature Explore' to develop a comprehensive design for two natural play spaces at our Head Start locations. The company also provided professional development for LCHS's education staff regarding natural play spaces. The Rotary Clubs of Pittston and Wilkes-Barre helped LCHS to clean up the space at our Beekman Street center in

the spring of 2022 in preparation for the natural play space. They also assisted with weeding, removing old garden beds, and assembling materials and outdoor seating. Once these play areas are complete, they will allow for Head Start teachers to extend learning to the outdoors by presenting inviting opportunities for story time, exploration with sand and water, and collaborative play with natural, outdoor materials.

GOLF TOURNAMENT SUPPORTS SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAM

A golf tournament sponsored by Navient, a loan management, servicing and asset recovery company, will provide funds to support LCHS's summer learning experience for children. The annual event held at



Blue Ridge Trail Golf Club in Mountain Top raised approximately \$25,000 for LCHS's Jump Start program. The program is a 4-week-long summer learning experience that offers comprehensive services for 30 eligible 3 and 4-year-old children who will attend LCHS the following fall.

This past year marked the 15th year for the event. In addition to the tournament, several businesses

provided sponsorship and gift donations for raffle drawings. The Navient Community Fund also awarded an \$8,000 grant to help support the summer learning program.

UNITED WAY OF WYOMING VALLEY PROVIDES FUNDING FOR EARLY HEAD START PROGRAM

LCHS's Early Head Start (EHS) program is a weekly home visiting program that provides comprehensive child development



and family support services to pregnant women, children from birth to age three, and their families. Our EHS program is funded to support 212 children and their families. The United Way of Wyoming Valley funds one EHS

Preschool children make the transition into kindergarten more successfully when their schools and families prepare together, and when their preschool and kindergarten teachers connect. LCHS has a system in place to help children transition from one program to the next. This includes the transition from Early Head Start to Head Start and Head Start to kindergarten.



SUMMER LEARNING PROGRAM PREPARES HEAD START STUDENTS FOR KINDERGARTEN

Following the 2021-2022 program year, LCHS offered a summer learning experience for Head Start students transitioning to kindergarten in the fall of 2022. This opportunity allowed children to make up for missed time in the classroom. Five classrooms of children attended LCHS's Wilkes-Barre and Edwardsville Head Start centers five days a week for three weeks in July. Transportation was also provided to and from school for most children. The summer learning session was made possible by funds received from the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act.

BLANKETS OF LOVE

Alexandria is a 5-year-old student at Luzerne County Head Start's Tunkhannock center who is headed to kindergarten in the fall. She spent two years in the



Head Start program. Her family worker, Julianne Pettit, or "Miss Julie," says Alexandria loves to help her classmates.

The 5-year-old girl lives with her grandmother, who experienced some hardships this past winter that put the family in a state of homelessness. Miss Julie learned about Project Donate Joy (DJ) from Luzerne County Head Start's family engagement team. The group provides handmade quilts for children. Each quilt is crafted with unique material, so no two are alike. Without reliable transportation and a temporary housing situation, Miss Julie thought the personalized blanket would be the perfect sentiment for Alexandria. The volunteers from Project DJ put together a special blanket for Alexandria and Miss Julie brought the blanket to her. Miss Julie said Alexandria was so thankful and loved the new blanket.

Alexandria enjoys spending time with her mother, father, baby brother, and 8-year-old sister, Izabella, who was a former Head Start student. Miss Julie recently helped Alexandria's mother find a high chair for her baby brother and says she does whatever she can to make sure Alexandria and her family have everything they need.

"We are here for Alexandria, and her family. They really appreciate the help that we provide to them."



MAKING A DIFFERENCE AT HOME

Luzerne County Head Start has been an important part of helping Alejandra raise her children. The mother of four first learned about LCHS more than a decade ago. Since then, EHS has taught her that early education makes a difference. Before then, she did not understand the importance of singing, reading, or playing with her children. Now, it is an important part of her daily routine.

"My youngest daughter, Angela, really enjoys reading and singing. When my family educator walks into the room, she sits down and requests her special song."

Alejandra says the most important aspect of the program for her family is the educational component. Following a routine has also been an important part of early learning.

"My family educator follows a routine that Angela loves. As soon as she sees her, Angela knows there will be singing, dancing and reading. If she hears the family educator's name, she runs to the door to greet her."

Alejandra's family educator has also helped Angela overcome some obstacles.

"Currently, I am dealing with a behavior problem with my daughter. She is assisting me with techniques and resources to help me learn about positive reinforcement. During our home visits, she goes over the tips and demonstrates different techniques."

Alejandra says Luzerne County Head Start's program has made a significant difference in her family's life.

"EHS helps parents learn to be effective teachers for their children, reach their goals, and provides necessary resources in difficult situations."

HEAD START HELP FOR CHILDREN & FAMILIES

Maily is a Head Start mom who is a full-time employee working to obtain her associate degree in the criminal justice field. She hopes that by furthering her education she can improve herself and provide a better life for her children. Maily learned about Head Start through the WIC program after the birth of her first child. Her 5-year-old daughter, Juliet, is now a student at Luzerne County Head Start's HIP center in Hazleton. Maily says she enrolled her daughter in the program because it was important to her that Juliet had an early education where she would learn basic concepts, such as letter recognition and writing her name.

“As a full-time worker and student, it is difficult to find time to teach my daughter the little things, such as colors, letters and how to manage her emotions around others. The Head Start program has given her the opportunity to learn, develop new skills and interact with other children her age.”

The Head Start program has also helped Maily to be successful in school. She needed some assistance with payment for books. Maily's daughter's Head Start teacher provided her with a referral that helped her to get the materials she needed.

“My daughter's teacher has shown a continued interest in both my parenting and how I am doing in school. She calls me almost weekly to make sure I have what I need. Her help and concern is greatly appreciated.”

Maily says the Head Start program has helped her to become a better parent and her children to thrive.

“I would recommend this program because I see daily the educational improvements in my children. LCHS also provides my children with a healthy environment to grow.”

nutrition: THE CORNERSTONE OF HEAD START

RIGHT FROM THE START, EAT SMART!

Wilkes-Barre City Health Department in conjunction with Luzerne County Head Start, Inc. (LCHS) and Maternal & Family Health Services held an all-day childhood nutrition event at LCHS's Beekman Street center in Wilkes-Barre in June of 2022.



The event was held to help parents learn about the many benefits that come from healthy eating at a young age. All families who attended were given a \$15 voucher for the Wilkes-Barre farmers market to encourage the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables. Several community partners were

in attendance to provide information, activities and kid-friendly giveaways. The project was funded by the Pennsylvania Department of Health's Preventive Health and Health Services Block Grant. Another event is planned for the fall of 2022.

SUMMER FARMERS MARKETS PROVIDE FRESH PRODUCE TO FAMILIES

LCHS held a series of outdoor farmers markets this past summer to help families bring farm fresh produce to their tables. The project is part of our agency's farm to early childhood education (ECE) initiative. Farm to ECE is a group of activities that offer increased access to healthy, local foods to enhance the quality of early learning programs and improve the lives of the program's children, families and staff.

Children who are part of LCHS's year-round Early Head Start home visiting program and those enrolled in Head Start preschool summer services received a grocery tote of fresh produce to take home each Wednesday for three weeks in July. In total, \$5,000 worth of produce purchased from Rowlands Pennsylvania Produce, Falls, was distributed to these children and their families. The project provided fresh food to more than 130 children from birth to age five and their families.



Co-owner of the farm, William Banta, said the opportunity to partner with LCHS was a tremendous help for his family's small business.

"The COVID-19 pandemic presented a number of challenges for us. Farm expenses have gone up and our regular sales have been reduced, especially to restaurants. Many never re-opened and others haven't fully bounced back. This opportunity fits right into what we aim to do."

While Banta admitted farming is challenging work, he enjoys the relationships he has formed with charitable organizations like Head Start. This is the second year LCHS has participated in this initiative with Rowlands.

Last year, funding for the project was provided by a grant from the Pennsylvania Head Start Association. This year, the program was supported with funds from the American Rescue Plan – Early Childhood Relief Funds.

Farm to ECE activities support healthy eating habits, provide a connection to local food and agricultural communities, and teach children how food grows.



Head Start HIGHLIGHTS 2021-2022:

HEAD START ALUMNI RECEIVE SCHOLARSHIPS

Each year former Head Start students graduating from high school and moving on to post-secondary education have the opportunity to apply for an LCHS scholarship. Traditionally, these awards are presented to students during LCHS's annual alumni scholarship luncheon. This year, LCHS held a small ceremony at its central office location in Wilkes-Barre, where the 2022 student scholarship winners had the opportunity to meet with other scholarship recipients, their sponsors, and receive their awards. Thanks to the support of our community, LCHS was able to provide 12 high school seniors from six school districts in Luzerne County with scholarships totaling \$18,100. To date, Head Start alumni have been awarded \$311,350. The scholarships are funded through private sponsors including local businesses, organizations & community leaders.

NEW HEAD START CLASSROOM OPENS AT COLLEGE IN HAZLETON

LCHS opened its newest classroom at Luzerne County Community College's (LCCC) Hazleton Center in January of 2022. The location was chosen because of the high need for Head Start services in Hazleton. The classroom provides comprehensive services to 18 qualifying 3 and 4-year-old children who live in the Hazleton area.

College President, Thomas Leary, said he is pleased to continue the valuable partnership with LCHS through the addition of the classroom at LCCC's Hazleton Center. The newest classroom is LCHS's fourth classroom on the campus of Luzerne County Community College.

Three other Head Start classrooms are located on the college's main campus in Nanticoke. LCHS also provides Head Start services in Hazleton at its Carson Street, HIP and Vine West locations. The EHS center is located along West Chestnut Street in the city.

LCHS HONORS STAFF & OUTSTANDING COMMUNITY PARTNERS

LCHS held a virtual recognition ceremony in May to celebrate our agency's dedicated employees and our 2021-2022 Outstanding Community Partners. Staff who celebrated a milestone year of service received a personalized gift and were recognized during a special video presentation. The 2022 Outstanding Community Partners were also celebrated for their significant contribution to the program.

LCHS also awarded maintenance employee, Charles Josulevicz, with the second annual Bold Leadership Award for his outstanding service to the agency. The 2022 virtual recognition ceremony for LCHS's staff and Outstanding Community Partners took place on the 57th anniversary of Head Start's founding.

TEEN PURCHASES BILINGUAL BOOKS FOR HEAD START CHILDREN

Fourteen-year-old, Lizzie Shacklett, an eighth grade student who currently resides in Montgomery County, purchased several bilingual books for children in LCHS's Head Start preschool program. The young woman, who was recently named "Miss Luzerne County's Outstanding Teen," is focused on raising awareness about the importance of literacy in young children.

The Head Start program was in need of bilingual books for children who are dual language learners. The young woman sold some of her preloved clothing in order to raise money to purchase these books.

Profits obtained from the sale of her preloved clothing allowed Lizzie to purchase three dozen books for 3 and 4-year-old children at LCHS's Beekman Street location in Wilkes-Barre. Lizzie's goal is to donate as many books as possible to schools, educational centers and shelters.


his service to the children and families at LCHS and for his dedication to carrying out the mission of Head Start.





Results of the 2021 financial audit of Luzerne County Head Start, Inc. reported no findings or material weaknesses.


2021 FUNDING SOURCES

ACCOUNTABILITY

Luzerne County Head Start, Inc.'s most recent monitoring report dated July 15, 2022 determined our program was out of compliance in one instance of health and safety. All other regulations met and exceeded the standards set forth by the Office of Head Start. A corrective action plan has been developed and will address this oversight by December 19, 2022.

ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL INFORMATION

- 2021 administrative costs were \$1,976,595 or 10.8% of total expenses
- LCHS has a minimum cost sharing of 20% of our federal funds awarded; in 2021 that share was \$2,856,554
- 2021 transportation costs were \$393,191 transporting 155 children
- *Due to COVID-19, Jump Start programming did not take place during the summer of 2022
